He also told us how the MS walk kb1doi, n1zrl, kb1ypz, n1jd, kb1wvo, and kc1rhm.

The meeting was called to order at 6:58 p.m. Walter ac1ae found that the minutes of the last meeting when Bob w1ltx nominated Lee w1lwt for President did not include Paul kb1qhrs' second of that motion. ham radio forms and promised to supply the forms to be posted on the w1npp.org website.

We discussed the list of events hams are involved with, May 4 and 5 Near Fest, New England QSO Party, a 200 mile bike race in Turner in June, also Field Day, Tim will check to confirm we can use the Airport for Field Day. Trek across Maine fathers day weekend. Ivan told us that the routes of the Dempsey Challenge will go to the coast and back this year. The routes may need to be changed to be went.

Miriam kc1aih made a motion to adjourn that was seconded by Clint kb1ypz. Vote: Passed adjourned at 7:53 p.m.
